

Trade Examining Board

What does the Trade Examining Board (TEB) do?

Individual TEB member duties include:

- evaluate the trade time (work experience) for individuals applying for examination, or progressing through an apprenticeship program; and
- evaluate individuals taking practical examinations in those trades which require them (markers for practical assessments).

Who makes up a TEB?

Recommended by the Trade Board, the TEB consists of employers, employees, which must be an on-the-tools journeypersons, and a SATCC representative. The TEB does not require equal representation from employers and employees.

How often do they meet?

The TEB meets on an “as-needed” basis, typically one to four times per year depending on the trade. Trades with practical assessments will meet more frequently than trades that don’t have a practical assessment.

What are TEBs responsible for?

The TEB determines:

- the eligibility of a candidate to challenge a journeyperson examination; or
- determines when an apprentice can advance to the next apprenticeship level. This can affect salary ranges and an apprentice’s eligibility to attend technical training.
