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INTRODUCTION

WHO IS THIS DOCUMENT FOR?

This document is for students, high school administrators, guidance counselors and Practical and Applied Arts teachers.

WHAT IS THIS DOCUMENT ABOUT?

Highly skilled workers are in demand. Employers need skilled tradespeople to help them compete and profit in a global market. Apprenticeship training is an opportunity for workers to learn the skills employers need.

The information provided in this document will help teachers prepare young people for careers in the designated trades. It will help them understand of the:

- apprenticeship and trade certification system;
- role of the Saskatchewan Apprenticeship and Trade Certification Commission (SATCC);
- programs that link high school education and apprenticeship training, and;
- designated trades in Saskatchewan.

SASKATCHEWAN APPRENTICESHIP AND TRADE CERTIFICATION COMMISSION

WHAT DOES THE SATCC DO?

The Saskatchewan Apprenticeship and Trade Certification Commission (SATCC) oversees and administers the apprenticeship and trade certification system in Saskatchewan.

In this role, the SATCC fulfills four primary functions.

The SATCC:

- trains apprentices;
- certifies tradespeople and apprentices;
- regulates the apprenticeship system of training; and
- promotes apprenticeship as a way for employers to meet their labour market requirements.

The SATCC is an industry-led, arms-length government organization dedicated to training apprentices and certifying tradespeople.



Apprenticeship is a work-based training system with either provincial or national certification.

SASKATCHEWAN YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP

The Saskatchewan Youth Apprenticeship (SYA) program teaches students about apprenticeship and careers in the skilled trades. 



AGRICULTURAL EQUIPMENT TECHNICIAN

Agricultural Equipment Technicians set up, diagnose, repair, modify, overhaul and maintain agricultural equipment.

WHAT DO THEY DO ON THE JOB?

- work on precision agricultural equipment, such as GPS-guided systems, autonomous vehicles and automated application systems
- diagnose faults or malfunctions using computerized and other testing equipment to determine extent of repair required
- adjust equipment and repair or replace defective parts, components or systems, using hand and power tools
- service attachments and working tools, such as harvesting and tillage equipment, blades and plough

- companies that own and operate agricultural equipment
- agricultural equipment dealers
- rental and service establishments

- high-tech shop work
- varying hours and seasonal work

AIRCRAFT MAINTENANCE ENGINEER TECHNICIAN

Aircraft Maintenance Engineer Technicians maintain and repair components of aircrafts, perform inspections and check systems.

WHAT DO THEY DO ON THE JOB?

- troubleshoot aircraft structural, mechanical or hydraulic systems to identify problems
- adjust and repair systems according to specifications, technical drawings, manuals and established procedures
- install or modify aircraft engines, and mechanical, hydraulic, flight control, fuel and pneumatic systems
- dismantle and reassemble airframes, aircraft engines or other aircraft systems for repair, overhaul and cleaning
- perform routine maintenance

- aircraft manufacturing, maintenance, repair and overhaul establishments

AUTO BODY AND COLLISION TECHNICIAN

Auto Body and Collision Technicians service, repair, replace and refinish motor vehicle bodies and frames.

WHAT DO THEY DO ON THE JOB?

- review damage reports and estimates of repair, cost and plan work to be performed
- repair and replace front-end components, body components, doors and frame and under-body components
- hammer out dents, buckles and other defects using blocks and hammers
- file, grind and sand repaired body surfaces using hand and power tools
- apply primers and repaint surfaces using hand and power tools

- inspect engines and drivetrains in operation, road test motor vehicles, and test automotive systems and components using computerized diagnostic and other testing devices
- adjust, repair or replace parts and components of automotive systems using hand tools and other specialized automotive repair equipment
- advise customers on work performed, general vehicle conditions and future repair requirements

BOILERMAKER

Boilermakers fabricate and assemble components to construct dust, gas, and liquid-tight structures and equipment.

WHAT DO THEY DO ON THE JOB?

- boilermakers use hot and cold methods to shape steel components into boilers, tanks, and vessels.
- they work from engineer-approved drawings, select rigging, and use cranes to lift components, ensuring systems are tested for defects.
- boilermakers lay out and mark heavy metals using drawing instruments and operate heavy metalworking machines.
- they fit and weld metal parts, and erect and install boilers and other metal products using power tools.

- lay bricks or other masonry units to construct or repair walls, foundations and other structures in residential, industrial and commercial construction
- lay bricks or other masonry units to construct chimneys and fireplaces
- restore, clean or paint masonry units on existing masonry structures
- read blueprints to calculate materials required

- precisely measure, cut, shape, assemble and join wood, and other materials
- work with a variety of hand, power and stationary tools and equipment
- creatively envision and conceptualize products based on client requirements
- prepare layouts that conform to codes, drawings and specifications

- read and interpret construction documents, drawings and sketches to determine specifications and calculate requirements
- calculate and lay out components to conform to building codes
- measure, cut, shape, assemble and join wood and other materials
- build foundations, install floor systems, lay sub-flooring and erect walls and roof systems
- install exterior windows and doors

- perform demolition, excavation, and compaction activities
- install municipal water and sewer lines
- ensure site security
- set up and remove access equipment
- work on concrete and masonry, steel, wood and pre-cast erecting projects activities

- municipal, provincial, and federal government projects
- hydro dams, roadways, bridges, railways, utility, landscape, and pipeline projects

Construction Electricians install, repair, test and maintain wiring, controls, motors and other electrical devices.

WHAT DO THEY DO ON THE JOB?

- read and interpret drawings, circuit diagrams and electrical code specifications to determine wiring layouts for new or existing installations
- test continuity of circuits using testing equipment to ensure compatibility and safety of systems following installation, replacement or repair
- troubleshoot and isolate faults in electrical and electronic systems and remove and replace faulty components

COOK

Cooks prepare, season and make soups, meat, fish, poultry, vegetables and desserts. They make sauces, gravies and salads.

WHAT DO THEY DO ON THE JOB?

- prepare and cook complete meals or individual dishes
- prepare and cook special meals for patients as instructed by a dietician
- oversee personnel in preparation, cooking and food handling
- may plan menus, determine size of food proportions, estimate food requirements and costs, and monitor and order supplies
- perform some meat cutting, and prepare basic baked goods

- hospitals and other health care institutions
- other establishments where food is served



- solder and manually assemble various components to designated locations on a printed circuit board
- install, align and adjust parts, components, wiring and harness to assemblies using hand and small power tools
- operate automatic and semi-automatic machines to position, solder and clean prescribed components on printed circuit boards
- may replace defective components and repair and overhaul older devices

WHAT IS APPRENTICESHIP?

Apprenticeship training is a structured system of supervised training leading to certification in one of Saskatchewan's designated trades.


Apprentices spend approximately 85 percent of the time working on the job, learning the knowledge and skills associated with a trade from a certified journeyperson. The remaining time is spent in theoretical and technical in-school training, which reinforces and expands on what is learned on the job.

WHY CHOOSE APPRENTICESHIP?

The importance of a post-secondary education cannot be overstated in today's labour market. Among the many career choices, apprenticeship training offers a great opportunity in any one of Saskatchewan's more than 40 designated trades and subtrades. Apprenticeship is a training system that is valued by employers. Certification in a Red Seal trade is recognized by industry across Canada.

There are numerous benefits of apprenticeship training:

1. Apprenticeship is industry-driven. Apprenticeships are created by industries needing skilled workers. The standards required in the workplace are met through industry's direct involvement in the training process. It is training designed by industry for industry.
2. Apprenticeship is employment-based, so you earn while you learn. An individual signs an apprenticeship training agreement with the employer and registers it with the SATCC to become an apprentice. You earn a wage while you are learning the trade. In general, employers increase wages to the apprentice after each level of technical training is completed.
3. Certification exams are developed and validated by industry and administered by the SATCC. Industry has set the standard of performance, both at the provincial and national level. Successfully passing these examinations means you have met the standard of excellence set out by industry.
4. Training is work-based. An apprentice spends approximately 85 percent of the training time working on the job under the supervision of a journeyperson.
5. Technical training reinforces what has been learned in the workplace. Approximately 15 percent of the apprentice's time is spent in technical training.

HIGH SCHOOL COMPLETION TO APPRENTICESHIP

Several high school Practical and Applied Arts (PAA) courses provide trade time hours should completers register as apprentices after graduation. High school students can acquire a maximum of up to 500 trade time hours total in addition to the 300 trade time hours earned by completing SYA.

Apprenticeship Recognition for PAA Courses in and Related to the Designated Trades

Students in these courses are introduced to the basics of the trade. With Trade Board approval, these courses provide trade time hours toward apprenticeship.

Apprenticeship Recognition for Locally Developed Courses of Study

Locally developed courses of study in the trades are developed by school divisions and First Nations education authorities and approved by the Saskatchewan Ministry of Education. With Trade Board approval, these courses provide trade time hours toward apprenticeship to students who successfully complete.


APPRENTICESHIP RECOGNITION OF PRACTICAL AND APPLIED ARTS COURSES IN AND RELATED TO DESIGNATED TRADES

Practical and Applied Arts (PAA) courses provide learning opportunities that help students make the transition from school to work.

While factors such as time limitations may restrict the depth of training that high schools can offer, students are introduced to the basics of a trade. Students also learn the importance of safety in the workplace and skills that facilitate entry level employment.

Students who successfully complete a PAA course in a designated trade can apply for trade time hours towards apprenticeship. These trade time hours will provide advanced standing for time spent in training when the student register as an apprentice. In other words, the time required to complete a high school credit will be considered time worked in the trade as an apprentice.

To receive advanced standing towards apprenticeship, students must provide a copy of their high school transcripts when they apply to become apprentices. Details on this transcript will help determine trade time hours for each completed course.





APPRENTICESHIP RECOGNITION FOR LOCALLY DEVELOPED COURSES OF STUDY

This section refers to locally developed courses in the trades that are developed by school divisions or First Nations education authorities and approved by the Saskatchewan Ministry of Education.

A school division or First Nations education authority may want to develop its own course of study in a newly designated trade or to meet local needs and/or interests.

Locally developed courses of study **require prior approval** from the Curriculum Unit, Student Achievement and Supports (SAS) Branch, Ministry of Education. In a designated trade, special conditions must be met before any locally developed courses of study also receives approval from the Saskatchewan Apprenticeship and Trade Certification Commission. When a course is authorized in a designated trade, advanced standing towards apprenticeship may be available through the Saskatchewan Apprenticeship and Trade Certification Commission.

For a locally developed course to be recognized for advanced standing towards apprenticeship, the following criteria must be met:

- the course must be approved by the Student Achievement and Supports Branch of the Ministry of Education as per the [Policy and Procedures for Locally Developed Courses of Study](#);
- the course, the instructor and the facility may need to be inspected by the Commission before approval is given; and
- if a work placement component is included, the work study guidelines found within the Practical and Applied Arts Handbook must be followed. (The PAA Handbook can be found at: www.curriculum.gov.sk.ca under "Browse by Subject", Practical & Applied Arts. The Handbook is located under the "PAA Supports" menu.)

Please note: Approvals must be obtained when a school division or First Nations education authority wants to develop its own locally developed course in a designated trade.

Designated personnel access the [Locally Developed Courses](#) portal and follow the steps detailed in the Policy and Procedures section.



Once all steps have been successfully completed, final approval for the course will be granted by the Curriculum Unit, Student Achievement and Supports Branch, Saskatchewan Ministry of Education.



After approval is received, the school division or First Nations education authority sends a copy of the course document and the names of the instructors and high schools offering the course to the SATCC to request course approval. The facility may need to be inspected by the SATCC before approval is given.
